MISSION

UHeights promotes lifelong learning, creativity, culture, community activism, and the preservation of our historic building.

HISTORY

Built as an elementary school in 1902 in response to the burgeoning University of Washington population, University Heights Center was the first school for thousands of neighboring children for 87 years. In 1989, due to declining enrollment, the school shuttered its doors. It was reborn again as a community center —University Heights Center— in 1990, when the community came together to save the building from demolition.

Now on the National Registry of Historic Places as well as a City of Seattle Historic Landmark building, University Heights Center continues to serve Seattle through a wide variety of classes, workshops and programs. From arts & cultural programming that connect and engage our community members to critical human services that extend basic necessities and meaningful resources to our more marginalized neighbors, University Heights Center establishes itself as the vital heart of a burgeoning community.

UHeights is a critical anchor in a burgeoning neighborhood. We are home to 12 communityfocused resident organizations. Together, we provide services that bolster our surrounding neighborhood through programming centered around early childhood education, K-12 specialized education, afterschool arts activities, housing solutions, healthy living alternatives, environmental activism, and more. Collectively, we support over 200 employees and host over 100 volunteers generously contributing their time and talents towards our mission.

RESIDENT ORGANIZATIONS HIGHLIGHTS:

YUGAKUSHA SCHOOL is a Japanese language school for Japanese and Japanese American children who want to pursue a traditional Japanese education in the U.S.

THREE DRAGONS ACADEMY is dedicated to providing arts enrichment to youth and families seeking alternative education or supplementary arts tutoring through their art, music and theater-based curriculum.

NORTHWEST BOYCHOIR and **VOCALPOINT**! Seattle strive to make available music education and performance opportunities for children and young adults while contributing to the cultural life of the community by providing access to a unique choral resource.

ARTS& CULTURE

UHeights has served as a meeting place for artists, activists and educators of all ages and cultures for nearly 120 years. We host hundreds of community and cultural groups who provide classes and events, such as gender non-conforming Swing Dance classes, Scottish Dancing, the Nepalese Society, civic/advocacy meetings, the Neighborhood Farmers Market Association, Seattle Public Libraries, and much more. UHeights also sponsors many free opportunities for family friendly events, a summer music/cultural series, in addition to managing The Auditorium, which hosts a diverse array of performances, including music, theater, film, lectures and more.

WHEIGHTS THEATRE ALLIANCE Our alliance has grown to 18 small local theatre and performing groups presenting close to 100 free or pay-what-you-can performances each year. Nearly all the member groups are led by and/or produce works by people of color, immigrants, the LGBTQ+ community, and women.

UHEIGHTS ARTIST COLLECTIVE Over 30 artists display an ongoing Gallery of works throughout the halls of our historic building. The Collective also hosts Art Walks to bring together our artistic community from visual artists and artisans, jewelry makers, and clothing creators to performers in dance, music, and poetry.

SOCIAL JUSTICE FILM FESTIVAL UHeights participated in the festival as just one venue showcasing documentaries and narrative films pertaining to issues including incarceration, oppression, environment and sustainability in an effort to bring together community members to discuss and advocate for change.

2019 SUMMER PARK POP-UP We collaborate with the Neighborhood Farmers Market Association to host an extravaganza of delights for the average 5,000 patrons of our Saturday Farmers Market. The UHeights plaza is activated with live music and dance performances by local musicians and cultural groups, a unique Food Truck Round-up and table displays by our own UHeights Artist Collective.

SECOND SATURDAYS Offering many FREE and pay-what-you-can performances geared towards families and children, UHeights was proud to host The Evan's Family Variety Show, Daffy Dave, and Caspar Babypants.

HUMAN SERVICES & COVID-19 RESPONSE

When the COVID-19 pandemic began, we realized UHeights was positioned to be an important community anchor throughout the crisis. UHeights and its resident organizations quickly pivoted to address the newfound needs of our community, with a focus on our most marginalized neighbors. While UHeights is closed to the public, we remain open to provide many critical services and resources.

A *SAFE LOT* for people living in their cars with Tiny House kitchenette, laundry, shower and bathroom.

EMERGENCY CHILDCARE for essential workers.

Space for the *FARMERS MARKET* which reopened in April and continues important food distribution.

Distributed 300 CLOTH MASKS to our community.

ONLINE CLASSES and arts and cultural programming, including Bollywood Dance, Zumba classes, Thursdays at 10 (book clubs, etc.), poetry classes, and an emotional support group led by a licensed therapist to help people manage stress in their lives. We have had record attendance and attendees from across the world!

THE YOUTH EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM

UHeights is proud be one of the first businesses in the U District to successfully hire youth for both short- and long-term employment opportunities where they gain valuable job training while earning a living wage.

SO PRESERVATION CON

Old buildings like UHeights are integral to the social fabric of our rapidly growing and gentrifying City's culture--a culture that is at great risk of losing its original character. The historic UHeights building tells the story of our City's past, while providing a space for the public to learn about our local history.

- 2009 The University Heights School is purchased from the Seattle School District with State of Washington, King County, City of Seattle and UHeights funds.
- 2010 UHeights is registered as a National Heritage Site by the US Department of the Interior.
- 2014 New Playground is installed.
- 2015 Seismic Retrofit and renovation of grounds is completed.
- 2016 UHeights Plaza Constructed
- *2017* The Auditorium is renovated.
- 2019 Water Mediation Completed! Roof, parapets, and cornices are repaired.
 - Elevator Installation Project begins
 - Approximately 45% of the \$1.5 million budget is raised
 - Necessary pre-construction work is completed.
 - Design process to be completed by fall of this year, with construction slated for completion in the fall of 2021.

CURRENT - Our staff works daily to respond to the needs of the building. They refurbished two floors on our main level with 4 more floors planned within our resident organizations. The vintage chalkboards in The Auditorium were painted by volunteers of Nordstrom on Advocacy Day with a new blackboard coating to prolong their use.


